

Apple TV set top box is here to stay, but is it here to stay for very long? Queen's Park: Union's Cost In Quebec Vote
WASHINGTON - Wednesday's vote on Quebec independence saw a loss for Quebec separatists, but one that's being met with consternation within the fledgling government in Ottawa. Canada's House of Commons voted 83-53 against allowing a referendum on Quebec sovereignty on June 30, 2000. The vote prompted the Liberal government to throw its weight behind the Canadian government's promise to defend the integrity of Canada. Prime Minister Jean Chrétien called the result "a very important day for Canada." "What the Canadian people have done is decided that the only way they want to live, and by their

own choice, is together," he said. "Canada will keep its unity and its cohesiveness, and we will continue to work with all Canadians together in the interest of Canada." Quebec had threatened to boycott the vote if Ottawa did not allow it. Quebec Premier Lucien Bouchard said the result was a "seismic shock," and vowed to continue his quest for sovereignty. "The status quo was not an option. It was unacceptable for the majority of the people of Quebec," he said. But in a news conference after the vote, a visibly upset Bouchard said, "There's a lot of noise around Ottawa." "There is no such thing as a consensus," he said. "The Canadian government... has not done its homework, and has not listened to the people of Quebec." "We are ready for a war," he said. "We will not back down." Prime Minister Chrétien quickly backed up the government's position. "We are fully committed to the unity of Canada and to the values of co-operation, stability and peace," he said. The vote came after a previous bid for a referendum in 1995 failed when the Liberals opposed the proposal. The first ministers of Canada, Quebec and the provinces of Ontario and British Columbia met in Ottawa last week to outline an economic framework for an independent Quebec. Despite the defeat, the other premiers were quick to compliment the federal government's position in refusing to hold a referendum that would break up the country. "It is a vote to continue, to continue on the path of cooperation," said British Columbia Premier Gordon Campbell. "They 82157476af
